SEMINAR SPEAKERS









Neslihan Cevik is a Postdoctoral Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Studies in Culture, University of Virginia. She studies how religions respond to global-modernity and associated changes. In a current book project, she identifies the rise of a new Islamic orthodoxy in Turkey, and terms this form Muslimism. Muslimism presents itself through new Islamic institutions, ranging from Islamic fashion shows to political formations, where Muslims engage modernity by using Islam. Extensions of this work include a project on Muslimist women's role in religious innovation and change. Neslihan has published in academic and policy, and major American and Turkish papers.

Gabriele Mentges is Professor of the Cultural History of Clothing/Fashion/Textiles at the Institute for Arts and Material Culture, Technische Universität Dortmund. She has also served as a curator at the State museum of Württemberg. Prof. Mentges has lead several international projects, among which the most recent focused on Modernity of Traditions. Uzbek textile heritage as a cultural and economic resource (2010-2012), carried out in collaboration with many Uzbek Universities and research centers. Her research interests include the history of clothing and body, the discourse on fashion, museology, every day and industrial culture, with a particular concern for clothing.

Simona Segre Reinach is Professor of Fashion Theory and Fashion Design at Università di Bologna. She has written from a global perspective about fashion theory in publications such as The Fashion History Reader and Fashion Theory. She is on the Board of Advisors of Fashion Theory and Dress Cultures (Tauris, London). She is a member of MIC (Moda Immagine Consumi), a research center at Università degli Studi of Milan. In Italian she has written four books: Mode in Italy. Una lettura antropologica (1999), La Moda. Un'introduzione (2005, 2010), Orientalismi. La moda nel mercato globale. Manuale di sociologia, comunicazione e cultura della moda (2006), Un mondo di mode. Il vestire globalizzato (2011).

Efrat Tseëlon is Professor of Fashion Theory at the School of Design of the University of Leeds. She has published widely on the theory of fashion as masquerade, ethics and fashion, fashion communication (visual language and ideology), and critique of methodology. Her publications include *The Masque of Femininity* (Sage 1995) and Masquerade and Identities: Gender, Sexuality & Marginality (Routledge 2001) and she is the founder and editor of the journal Critical Studies in Fashion and Beauty.
