PRESENTATION

The decline in religious practices in Europe has partly coincided with the arrive of the New Age, as well as with the end of the Cold War – in view of the growing role of the Gulf States in Arab domestic politics, as well as the formation of a 'global Jihad' approach, at the end of the confrontation between the United States and the Soviet Union (Soviet-Afghan War 1979-1989) – developing a common denominator through the weakening of curricula of religious knowledge as religious understanding of the contemporary world.

The inability of hermeneutics has clearly emerged and has been overcome by political and economic needs and pressures as well as by the exaggerated media slogan of 'Clash of Civilizations', which is certainly more profitable than that of: "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another."

This workshop seeks to investigate the main risk of contemporary religious violence in the Middle East and Europe. As well as the inability of the same media to correctly interpret the current situation, stimulating an 'overwhelming' representation of Islam and 'Eastern' geography as one of perennial war, barbaric and without any possibility of 'redemption'.

Conversely, a historical approach and, today also, prominently capable of linking past and present, emphasizing the real understanding of all narratives, genuine, utopian and of unreal violence, that have investigated the connection between religious identity, gender violence, incursions and conquests, political control and indirect norms.
